

Helping Your Child Succeed

Your Child May Not Learn Like You

You probably remember what school was like when you were a child. You know what subjects you enjoyed- and you may remember the subjects you didnøt like. You also know how you learned the information the best. Maybe you retained more when you read your textbook or maybe you liked it better when the teacher lectured or maybe you did the best with hands-on activities. You likely still discover new information the same way you picked it up in school. However, when it comes to your child, you need to forget everything you remember about your school preferences. That may sound drastic, but itos really necessary if you want your child to do his or her best. Your child is a unique individual. Not only is it likely that he or she likes different subjects, but your child may also learn differently than you do.

In terms of learning styles there are three main types:

- 1. Visual ó learns best by seeing or observing the way something looks or works
- 2. Auditory ó learns best by hearing or listening
- 3. Kinesthetic or tactile ó learns best by hands-on activities

Your child may use one or all of these styles as he or she progresses through school. The following a re strategies to help your child make the most of his or her dominant learning style.

Visual Learners

Does your child have a hard time remembering names but can always remember a face? Are they able to see images in their mind? If so, they are more than likely a visual learner.



- * Ask your child to highlight important information on worksheets or handouts with a marker or draw a line under it with a pencil.
- * Make flashcards for your child. Simple math facts and vocabulary words lend themselves well to flashcards
- * Help your child make charts, diagrams, and graphs to better understand and express information

Auditory Learners

Auditory learners retain more information when the lesson is presented verbally or when the teacher questions the whole class. Do they do well in class discussions? Are they easily distracted by noises? If so, they are more than likely auditory learners.

- * Read aloud to your child or have them read out loud
- * Use mnemonic devices (tricks to learn words ó example would be learning the colors of the rainbow: Roy G. Biv)
- * Have your child study with a friend so they can talk out loud about the information

Kinesthetic or Tactile Learners



Is your child the only person in the family who can run the computer or run electronic equipment? Do they love to build things? Are they often out of their seat in the classroom? Yes, yes, and yes? Then your child learns best with hands-on activities!

- * Ask your child to act out or demonstrate concepts.
- * When helping with homework, give him or her real world perspective on the content. If they are working with fractions ó get out the measuring cups!
- * Take advantage of hands-on projects. They will love these choices the best!
- * Allow your child access to multimedia applications like PowerPoint and learning tools on the computer to learn or create projects.



Looking Ahead With The Budget

At the regular meeting of the board on February 18th, 2008 the board of education approved recommended reductions for the 2008-2009 school year. In our 11th consecutive year of declining enrollment we have seen reductions each year for several years. In order to make ends meet each year, we have had to reduce in order to stay within the certified budget. Schools are an odd duck in comparison to businesses. When businesses see an increase in operating expenses they have the option of absorbing the cost or passing it on to the consumer. In schools we do not have the option of absorbing our increase and we can not pass on the added expense to our consumers. Some have stated we should increase taxes and not reduce. In my opinion, this is only a viable response if we were projecting a decline in enrollment of a short period of time. The state has projected us to lose students until we reach approximately 1300 students. Currently, we are 125 above that mark and the projections are for us to lose approximately 25 per year. I estimate that we will experience this same kind of reductions for the next 4-6 years at a minimum if something doesn't change that will bring students to our district and stop the declining trend.

I am positive about the economic growth of Independence as well as our outlying towns of Brandon and Rowley and am very pleased to see affordable housing being started again in our area. The more we can market our district the better. I am hopeful that the community will be able to come together for the future of our high school and that more families will chose to live in our communities for the outstanding programming that we have to offer.

I believe we have an extremely dedicated staff that care deeply for the success of our students and the expectations that we have for their future success. The Independence Community School District is a wonderful place for your child to receive their education. Our expectations are high and we are at the top of the WaMaC conference in reference to the success our students have in achievement scores. You can be proud of how our K-12 staff is preparing your child for future success.

<u>This Winter's Crazy Weather Leads to Change in</u> School Calendar



As I write this article, school has been cancelled once again due to inclement weather and at last count we have had to either start school late or release school early due to bad weather nine times (as of this writing). June! However, the nine days that were shortened are lost instructional time for our students.

As a result of the shortened days, many teachers and Administration are concerned that students will miss out on valuable instruction and lost curriculum delivery. This decision was proposed and accepted at the regular Board of Education meeting on Monday February 18th. 
