## If The Shoe Fits <br> By Christina Carnelly - School Nurse

Now that the warm weather is here the children are wearing their warm weather clothing and footwear. This sometimes brings on a new problem for children. When young children wear open-toed sandals with no socks, sandals with higher heels, strappy sandals, or thong-type flipflops, they are running the risk of injury to their feet and toes. Many injuries have been seen involving students here at school that would have most likely been prevented had the child not been wearing the type of shoes that described above. These shoes are not sturdy for the type of play that students of this age participate in at recess such as running, jumping, climbing, or crawling. Wood chips get pushed up under toe nails, skin is torn around toes and heels, blisters form, and sprains and fractures occur. Many times these injuries were caused solely or in part by the shoes that the student was wearing.


Please consider not sending your student to school in these types of shoes. They should be wearing sturdy shoes and socks to school. This will prevent blisters, sores, cuts and more serious injuries. Also, please note that on page 7 of the school calendar/handbook it does state that students are not to wear thong-type flip-flops to school.

Thank-you for your understanding of this matter and we hope we have a safe and enjoyable end to our school year.

## Summer School

Summer School will be scheduled for any student who has passed all of the required GLE's for either math, science, language arts, Family Consumer Sciences, and physical education. Parents should have received midterm reports late April; students who are in danger of qualifying for summer school will be monitored closely. Students who fail a GLE must attend re-teaching sessions and be reassessed in order to pass the course.

Whenever a student fails a GLE, the teacher sends a letter home with the student to notify the parent and schedule re-teaching opportunities. Students who fail to report for the re-teaching times will receive a Saturday-In-School suspension.

Students can not expect to wait until the end of the school year to schedule re-teaching times and reassessment for GLE's that were taught early in the year. A teacher's priority is with those students who need re-teaching on the most recent GLE's.

If you have a question about your child's grade(s), please give either the teacher or me a call as soon as possible.

## Course Selection Sheets



The scheduling process for the $07-08$ school year will soon be under way. Course selection sheets will be handed out to the 6 th and 7 th graders. The course selection sheet indicates both required and elective classes; the sheets need to be filled out, signed by a parent, and returned to the student's advisor by May 16. This information will be used when scheduling students this summer. Students who fail to return the course information sheets may not end up with the electives they prefer.

## Second Chance Reading

This past school year students who scored below the $41 \%$ ile in reading comprehension on the ITBS were placed in an Extended reading class to improve their reading skills. The reading class was scheduled in place of one the students' exploratory experiences. Due to restrictions with the budget, we're not sure that we will be able to offer the Extended Reading class during the 2007-08 school year. If the funding is available and the class is offered, letters will be sent to the parents of those students who qualify for the reading class.

## Awards Assembly

The last awards assembly of the year will be late May 30 at 8:45 in the gym. Eighth graders who have 1) maintained a 3.5 grade point average since 6th grade and 2 ) achieved at the 85 th percentile or higher in math or reading on the Iowa Test of Basic Skills this school year will be recognized and awarded the Presidential Award for Outstanding Academic Excellence.

Students who have earned the Presidential Physical Fitness Award will also be recognized. Of course, we will also present the Schrage Award to the 8th grade boy and/or girl who best demonstrate the characteristics taught in the Quest program.

Parents of students receiving an award will be notified by letter inviting them to the assembly.
