

You Can Create a Bright Future for Your Child

School will be out soon and as the end of the year approaches, students are likely to think õYeah, no more school!ö No more school does not mean there doesnøt have to no more learning. Many families take vacations during the summer or take part in sport camps. But have you taken the time to think about continued learning? When you do take the time, do you think of summer school or can you get more creative? Remember, we are surrounded by learning opportunities every day. We just have to look for them!

Of course, if one of your childøs teachers recommends summer learning in a particular subject area, address that first. Summer school or a tutor could be helpful. Donøt be afraid to ask for guidance and referrals until you have found the resources your child needs.

Here are some ideas to expand your child's horizons while enjoying the summer break

For instance:

- <u>Have you ever visited you county extension office and learned about growing a vegetable or flower garden?</u> A summer garden can provide hours of learning away from the television and computer, as well as some delicious rewards or fresh flowers for the house.
- <u>Have you taken your child to a retirement home to volunteer?</u> Many retirement homes welcome children and adolescents into the retirement homes to serve coffee or even calling out bingo or simply visiting and talking about life experiences.
- On your family vacation, have you thought about places you can visit that will provide excellent learning experiences? If you are traveling through a state ó check to see if a historical figure once lived in any of the towns you are passing through ó you could visit the home. Maybe a factory that makes potato chips, or chocolate, or cars. There are even opportunities right in our own backyard that your children may not have seen.

<u>Do you discuss relevant issues with your child?</u> Share your views openly at home and allow your child to do the same. With this being an election year, what a perfect time to talk about the election process or some of the issues being discussed by the candidates. Allow your child to form opinions on their own ó without you telling them yours.

Learning experiences come in all shapes and sizes and some of the most valuable knowledge is not learned in a classroom. It is important to keep in mind that a goal of parents should always be to create lifelong learners. A child wongt be excited about learning if they feel pressured or if learning is

surrounded by negativity. This summer, make learning a top priority. As a partner in education, you can help create

a bright future for your child!

Audit Team Presents to CCC and Board of Education

Independence Community Schools is voluntarily conducting an audit of its academic programs and processes. Teresa McCune and Lou Howell of the Department of Education came to our district to go over the results of the audit to the Curriculum Coordinating Council and the Board of Education during its regular meeting on April 16th. They reported the strengths of our district as well as those items we might consider for further study. The Curriculum Coordinating Council, and the leadership teams in each building, have analyzed and discussed the findings of the audit documents and prioritized the areas we feel need to be focused on next school year. It should be noted that these are not new things to our district we are addressing; rather they are things we are currently doing but we are looking for ways to be more effective. The categories decided as areas of priority are as follows:

× Consistent Communication

- × Academic Goals and Expectations including using data to make instructional decisions at the classroom level
 - × Implementation issues related to the curriculum process

Though these are the three areas we will focus our energies on, we continue to improve in the other aspects noted in the audit. Monitoring instruction, learning team consistency, and quality professional development are a few of the other items the district wants to make more effective. The next steps in the audit process are to determine the current reality (what IS happening) in these three areas, what is the desired result (what we WANT to happen) and determine steps to reach the goals we have set for ourselves. Action steps will be created and we will monitor the implementation of these steps next year and in the future. Final action steps developed will be provided in the June newsletter.

Don't' Forget to Read & Write! By Title I Teachers

Research shows children lose 1 to 3 months of learning every summer. They forget the skills they worked so hard on during the school year. Then they have to work even harder to catch up in the fall. You can prevent this loss. Keep your kids reading! Here are a few ideas:

ÉSwap books with a friend throughout the summer.


ÉSet a goal of reading a certain number of books, then do it.

Now that the warm weather is here the children are wearing their warm weather clothing and footwear. This sometimes brings on a new problem for children. When young children wear open-toed sandals with no socks, sandals with higher heels, strappy sandals, or thong-type flip-flops, they are running the risk of injury to their feet and toes. Many injuries have been seen involving students here at school that would have most likely been prevented had the child not been wearing the type of shoes that described above. These shoes are not sturdy for the type of play that students of this age participate in at recess such as running, jumping, climbing, or crawling. Wood chips get pushed up under toe nails, skin is torn around toes and heels, blisters form, and sprains and fractures occur. Many times these injuries were caused solely or in part by the shoes that the student was wearing.

Please consider not sending your student to school in these types of shoes. They should be wearing sturdy shoes and socks to school. This will prevent blisters, sores, cuts and more serious injuries. Also, please note that on page 7 of the school calendar/handbook it does state that students are not to wear thong-type flip-flops to school.

Thank-you for your understanding of this matter and we hope we have a safe and enjoyable end to our school year.

NWEA Testing
