Exploratory Committee for New Junior-Senior High School Formed

An exploratory committee has been formed to examine the size, cost, and funding sources for a new Junior-Senior High School. A broad cross section of the district is represented on this volunteer committee. It includes parents, teachers, administrators, board of education members, coaches, farmers, city officials and alumni. The committee also has representation from all towns within the district (Brandon, Rowley, and Independence).

The exploratory committee has been researching sizes and features of new school facilities of similar size in eastern Iowa, as well as neighboring districts. The committee has toured the existing Junior-Senior High School to evaluate various aspects of a tentative design plan. Some of the committee members have also personally toured other facilities in the area. Additional sub committees have been identified to further research and analyze the project, such as a cost-benefit analysis committee and a marketing committee.

The committee recently met with the architectural firm of HSR & Associates to evaluate the most efficient and effective size of a new facility. One of the design goals is to utilize projected enrollment trends to ensure the structure is not too large yet allows for cost-effective expansion.

The committee recognizes that the help of teachers, parents, and community members from Brandon, Rowley, and Independence will be very important in accomplishing this project. A new secondary facility is essential to the future of the Independence Community School District. Our exploratory committee is currently organizing plans, and in the very near future we look forward to meeting with stakeholders to share proposed plans for a new facility.

Please contact me if you are interested in helping the district plan for the future. The exploratory committee expects to complete tentative design plans in the next few weeks, at which time, the efforts of the committee will be share with the public.

2011-2012 Projected Staffing

The Independence Community School Districtøs Board of Education held a work session on Monday, March 7th. Lynnette Engel, our Director of Finance, and I facilitated a discussion with the Board in regard to the financial outlook for the Independence Community School District. I know everyone has been wondering what the future will look like for our school in terms of projected staffing. Lynnette and I recommended the following to our Board:

- ❖ The decline in funding due to the decrease in enrollment this past year will be made up with leftover Federal Education Jobs money as well as the additional money we will receive due to the sharing of our Director of Transportation position with the Jesup School District.
- ❖ In regard to class sizes, we feel we can make some internal transfers to continue to stay within the 20-25 students per section through out the elementary levels without having to add or cut any current teachers.
- ❖ We are predicting right now to not make any major job or program cuts for the 2011-2012 school year. However, we go into this knowing that unless something changes, we may be looking at a ōfunding cliffo for the following year (2012-2013) which would require some cuts.
- ❖ We may need to eliminate positions currently paid with the Federal Education Jobs money. These employees were hired with the understanding that it might just be for one year.
- ❖ We have two major variables playing into our budget right now (as do all other schools)allowable growth and pre-school. Neither has been decided by the Legislature as of this writing. We are setting our budget and predictions using the 0% allowable growth estimate and also discussing what our PK4 options may be.

Lynnette and I have been working hard to get a handle on our school

ß budget. As you are aware, we ended the last school year with a negative balance. We are predicting that this year we will have a positive ending balance. All the cuts this district has had to endure the past couple of years have helped us start to chip away at our negative balance. And, we will continue to chip away until we can get to a healthy solvency ratio.

I continue to be impressed with what I am seeing in our classrooms and our activities programs. We have so very many good things happening each day. This school district does have a great number of strengths. But, are there areas for improvement? Absolutely, and it is my job to determine our needs, create an environment where all stakeholders can be heard and tackle adversity head-on. The business of education never ends. We will continually evaluate what we do as a school district and how we can help our students be the best they can be.



WHERE DOES THE MONEY COME FROM?



The study of school finance is a very complicated subject. The governmental bodies do their very best in trying to make sure it is complicated and confusing. However, there are a few simple ways to help explain school finance that I would like to share with you. There are three major sources that make up the majority of the budget for all schools. They are the Uniform Property Tax, State Aid and then the additional property tax portion. All school districts start out with what is referred to as a Uniform Property Tax assessed to them. Regardless of size, location or financial condition of the school, all districts in Iowa are assessed \$5.40 to make up the first tier of their school budget. In Independence, that generates around 15% of our total combined district cost. Compared to other districts such as Waukee and Okoboji who have very high property values, we rely heavily on the second portion of the puzzle and that is State Aid. The State of Iowa has decided over the years that regardless of how much you can raise in property taxes, they want all kids in the state to be on an equal playing field. With that said, the State will make sure every district is brought up to 87.5% of their combined district cost. What this means, is that rural Iowa districts, like Independence, are given a lot more state aid than your growing urban areas. To end the equation, every district is responsible to tax the additional amount needed to reach 100%. You can see with the graph below that Independence Community School District receives 68% of ites total combined district costs from State Aid and we pay a total of



The majority of the money we receive through State Aid and taxes go into our General Fund. As you can see to the right, we use 85% in our General Fund. The largest expense to come out of that fund of course are the salaries and benefits of our staff. We spend the remaining amount on supplies, purchased services and property. The school is told every year how much its total combined district costs will be. The formula is based on enrollment times the Regular Program District Cost determined by the state on an annual basis (currently at \$5,883). These two pieces alone determine 83% of our total budget. Independence Community Schools has had to make some very tough

32% through our property taxes. What this shows is that years where there has been a budget cut in State funding, it has really had an impact on Independence Schools since two-thirds of our funding is from State Aid.



budget decisions over the last few years. These decisions were based on economic situations the school was in. I am happy to report that these decisions are paying off as time moves on. Even though we are still in a negative cash situation, we are making headway to dig out from the hole and have set our budget on track to continue that climb in the right direction. I am driven on a daily basis with the shear excitement that soon this school will be financially stronger again.

I presented a power point presentation to the Board of Education last month on the basics of school finance and how it all applies to our school. This power point is out on the school website under the finance tab if you would like to look it over. As always, if you have any questions regarding school finance, please give me a call.

Third Grade News

One of our third grade math GLEs deals with measurement. The students measure objects for length, capacity, weight, and temperature using U.S. standard measurements. Mrs. Kimballøs class just started the measurement unit this week and they are enjoying themselves! To begin the unit, each student made a Mr. Gallon! Mr. Gallon is a visual aid we use to learn and understand customary capacity units. By studying Mr. Gallon, students can easily remember the number of each unit that makes up one gallon. For example, Mr. Gallonøs body is the gallon, each upper arm and upper leg represent one quart, each part of the lower arm and lower leg represent one pint, and each finger and toe represent one cup. They like their Mr. Gallons! The pictures show the class with their Mr. Gallons and two students measuring each other.





Fourth Grade

Fourth graders at West Elementary are exploring a variety of kinds of literature. Most recently, they have focused on biographies and autobiographies. Students have been given the opportunity to write their own autobiographies. The fourth grade has been trekking across the United States as they study the regions. Students recently finished units on the Southeast and are currently exploring the landforms, culture, and history of the Midwest. The students are working on a variety of concepts in math, which range from fractions and decimals to measurement and long division. They are also working to refine their problem solving skills in mathematics. In science, students have studied both the respiratory and circulatory systems. They are presently discovering the parts of the heart and the way the blood circulates oxygen throughout the body. The students have many more exciting learning opportunities to look forward to throughout the remainder of the year.



Fifth Grade

Fifth graders have been working hard to improve their math skills through small group intervention at the end of the day, three days a week. Examples of some things they are working on include: using manipulatives, problem solving, fractions, and of course improving basic math facts.

Students have also been learning reading skills in small group instruction that include learning how to read nonfiction and combining other curricular areas into reading time. The fifth grade would like to congratulate the fifth grade students who participated in the writing and poetry contest.

Mrs. Shaffer and Miss Bantz's classes have been discovering unique information on the skeletal and muscular systems. The fifth grade has also hosted a couple of special guests. One was Dr. Matt Fuelling, a chiropractor in Independence, who answered questions from the kids about bones and bone health. Another was Miss Maas's brother who works for the Black Hawk County Animal Rescue Program. He shared information about the program and brought several different types of owls to share with the fifth graders.

Students are anxiously awaiting another exciting field trip coming in May, Fish Iowa!

Curriculum and School Improvement

Professional Development

What do teachers do on our early dismissal days? These days are very important to our district as staff uses this time to grow in their professional expertise. We are using these days this year to focus attention on the Characteristics of Effective Instruction. These include teaching for learner differences, assessment for learning, student centered classrooms, checking for understanding, and providing instruction that provides the right amount of challenge and is relevant to studentsølives. Professional development is presented by a variety of people - staff, administrators, and outside speakers. Teachers sometimes work with their entire building and sometimes with their content or grade level teams. Learning, in order to be most effective, must be presented and reviewed on a regular basis. We are able to do that with our early dismissals twice a month.

<u>Do we have to have this many days?</u> The number of days allocated for professional development is set by the state. Our calendar committee recommends to the board when those days will be assigned on the calendar.

School Nurse News

Athletic physical night will be held on Wednesday, May 4th from 5:30 p.m.-7:00 p.m. at West Elementary. You can pick up a physical form from West Elementary or the Junior/Senior High School office.

Is your child over the age of 11? Many people believe that vaccines stop when a child enters kindergarten. Getting immunized is a life-long disease preventing process. Your child may be due for a booster of Tdap (tetanus, diphtheria, pertussis), or vaccines against diseases such as Hepatitis A, HPV, or meningitis. Now is a good time to check with your healthcare provider to see if your child needs any of these immunizations.

Warmer weather means more exposed skin to the sun. Remember, there is no such thing as a safe tan. Exposure to UV rays, whether by natural sunlight or tanning beds, increases your risk for skin cancer. Encourage your child to avoid tanning beds and use sunscreen when outdoors. Sunless tanning lotions are a safe alternative to sun damaged skin.

Vision changes, especially near-sightedness, have a high incidence of occurrence during adolescence due to changes in the eye caused by normal growth. Having your childøs vision examined by an optometrist or ophthalmologist is important at this stage of their development and should be part of regularly scheduled preventative health visits. Vision problems are easily corrected but only if identified.

ICSD, õMustang Roots and Shootsö School Garden Update

Here's a little history:

In the spring of 2009, our school garden started with 2 raised beds, purchased with Farm to School money, placed right outside Micki Sand-Cohenøs 1st grade classroom over at the old East building. She and her class planted tomatoes, potatoes, bell peppers, zucchini, and a few other little things. Micki used the vegetables in her classroom to make salsa, mashed potatoes and zucchini bread, all tying it into the lessons! We had just enough tomatoes left to serve them at lunch to all the students at East on one day.

In the Spring of 2010, we got permission to put a larger garden behind the Admin Building. Building the current garden was truly a community and school-wide effort! Joe Olsen and Mike Donnelly coordinated to have the custodians make 13 raised beds from the old bleacher seats. They also scooped dirt for us from the wetlands area and used the front-end loader to fill the beds once they were in place. Donated cardboard and newspaper were used as an under layer to keep the weeds down. Students and teachers together planted all of the plants that year, all in ONE day!! Middle School FCS students helped spread the mulch around between the beds, also to keep weeds and grass from growing up. The plants and seeds were donated by Micki Sand-Cohen and by Hawkeye Community College& Horticulture program.

At the end of the school year in 2010, suggestions for a name for the garden were taken from all students in the District. We then held a school-wide vote, so everyone could take part in the school garden. The new name for the school garden is õMustang Roots and Shootsö.

Produce from the garden last year was used in Micki Sand-Cohenøs classroom, and in the school lunches, as it was ready in the fall. Things like tomatoes, onions, a few peppers, zucchini, cucumbers, cabbage, potatoes, Brussels Sprouts and fresh rosemary, were all used in either the school lunches or in the classroom. Micki and Joe Olsen also had the kids harvest Brussels Sprouts one day last Fall. Joe then sauteed them in Mickiøs classroom, using the Cooking Cart, and put some shredded cheese on them. It is not an exaggeration to say that the students LOVED the Brussels Sprouts and even asked for seconds!

Here are few things we have in the works for this Spring: New Partnershipsi ...

- -We have a fund being set up through the Buchanan County Conservation Board just for the garden, so if anyone wants to donate, they are able to give easily through this fund. We already have a handful of community members who have offered donations as soon as we get the fund set-up.
- -Rudy Kubik has offered to till up any ground that we might need tilled.
- -Micki has been working with Loren Hamilton, who had volunteered to build a cold frame over one of the raised beds and build a compost bin for us. Loren talked to Spahn and Rose, who have now donated the Plexiglas and other materials to make the cold frame! A cold frame will enable us to start some plants in the ground early and also harvest some crops later in the fall.
- -Joe Olsen re-connected with FarmTek, a farm and garden supply company out of Dyersville. Sam Shroyer from FarmTek was hired as part of a new initiative that focuses on hoop house/greenhouse, hydroponics and vegetable growing so this is a work in progress for FarmTek. He came here and visited the schools with Joe and took a look at our garden, the greenhouse at West Elementary, and the greenhouse at the High School. We have just received estimates on both greenhouses from them and we'dl be taking a look at our options.
- -We received a donation of hundreds of seed packets from Scott Smalley, Oelweinøs High School Horticulture Teacher and FFA leader.
- -Weøve also developed partnerships with Hawkeye Community College. Dan Lichty, from their Horticulture Department and his students made garden plans for us last summer, donated plants, offered to grow plants for us to put in the garden this year and Dan has volunteered to come out and talk to our elementary classes.

Gardening in the Classroomí .

- -Joe Olsen, Jessi Dorsey and I have all been in discussions with Rhonda Sheets, whose High School students are working on logos and other marketing materials for the school garden. We hope to have such things as plant sign markers, signs in the garden to indicate ito purpose, brochures, posters, car window clings, t-shirts, and business cards.
- -Micki and Jessi are busy planning the beds using a vegetable garden planning program. Not only will the beds be planned this way, they are taking the whole plans that Dan Lichty and his students drew up for us, and just altering them to make it more childlike and funí . perhaps a winding yellow brick road is in the future for the garden!
- -5 or 6 teachers will also be using this program to plan a raised bed for their classrooms. Micki, Joe and Jessi will then work with each classroom to get the plants and seeds for them, have someone come to talk to their students, and get into the garden and get things planted this spring.

The Future of the Gardení .

- -Weøve also discussed õtaking overö the entire grassy area behind the Admin Building with Mike Donnelly. We are not to that point yet, but it may be a possibility in the future.
- -We will be applying for a \$500 grant through Team Nutrition to buy small equipment and plants for the garden and garden related activities.
- -Farmer's Market for the produce as it becomes ready in the summer and fall, until the crops are done producing.
 - --run by students, would teach gardening skills, marketing, sales, money management, and professional interaction with customers, AND would raise money!
- -Garden tours, given by students.
- -Possibly working with Val Maximovich to bring in Seniors to volunteer in the garden this summer, perhaps those who no longer have a garden of their own to work in.
- -Possibly doing some light processing of our own produce to sell as a fundraiser. (I am attending a webinar in April on light processing. I still need to look into what it takes to get a processing license for the school district.)

What's in store for next Fall?

There is a very important event happening in Buchanan County this fall, on September 15-17th. The Iowa Association of County Conservation Boards (IACCB) is having their annual conference here, at the Heartland Acres Agribition Center. The theme, based on a quote from Teddy Roosevelt, is õDo what you can, with what you have, where you are.ö

Joe Olsen, Micki Sand-Cohen, and I will be speaking at the event on Friday, Sept. 16th about our Farm to School program. Then on Saturday, Sept. 17th, attendees will be going on ±field tripsø, one of which will be to our schooløs prairie area, wetlands area, and the school garden.



Math Help at Home By Mrs. Tracy Curtis, 7th/8th Math Instructor

The general nature of math makes it an important subject to monitor throughout a child⁄s education. Early understanding and mastery of mathematical concepts is critical for success of material in the long run. Unfortunately, mastery of concepts may not show up in the present due to short and long-term memory skills. Too often some skills, or lack of skills, may not show up for months or even a year after mastery was suppose to have been achieved.

As a 7th/8th grade math teacher parents sometimes have concerns that they may not be able to help their child with what they are learning in class. Math concepts and understanding is much more than what they are currently learning in the classroom. As parents, be willing to discuss multiple representations of math. Estimation skills are used daily, from grocery bills to gas mileage. When shopping, discuss what discounts, and taxes mean. When dining, discuss calculating tips. Help teach measurements, fractions, and decimals, by having your children help with baking, building, and balancing checking accounts. All of these skills help reinforce concepts taught at each grade level, long-term memory skills, and real-life application of concepts.

As far as homework help, here are a few tips to help:

- ** Try having your child explain what they are doing. What the directions, notes, or book examples are showing. This will help put information in their words and hearing it aloud is helpful.
- ** Look through studentøs textbook and notes to help walk you through examples.
- ** Look over your childøs work ó regardless of age.
- ** Encourage your child to show their work. If they are having difficulties, it is much easier to see what they are thinking when you can see some work, for both parents and teachers.
- ** There is a wealth of information on the Internet including online tutorials, extra practice, and U-tube videos to discuss problems. Help guide your student through a search to find online help.


