ensure schools are accountable to the community and strongly advocate continuous improvement in student learning. That job entails an endless string of meetings and school functions to attend; reams of reports, agendas, proposals, and other information to read and study; and a host of difficult decisions to make.

Board members contribute thousands of hours each year leading their districts. Whether it is crafting policies, hiring top-notch administrators, listening to staff and students concerns or recognizing outstanding programs, board members always keep their eyes on the goal of student achievement.

In recognition of the dedicated service of Iowa School Board Members, May 6-12, has been designated School Board Recognition Week. Please join us by saying "thanks" to our ICSD School Board Members, **Brian Eddy, Eric Smith, Rusty Donnelly, Stacy Henderson and John Christensen,** and recognizing their efforts throughout the year.

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One-to-One Computer Lap Top Initiative:

Many K-12 schools have one-to-one student/staff computer lap top initiatives all across Iowa and the nation. The definition of one-to-one computing is essentially providing every teacher and student with a portable lap top, notebook or tablet PC for continuous use both at home and in school. By providing students with access to this technology, teachers are changing their teaching strategies and addressing the 21st Century Learning Skills. Students become more involved and invested in the discovery of their own knowledge. Utilizing this technology also enables teachers to plan for and respond to student learning differences.

For the 2011-2012 school year, we purchased every teacher his/her own lap top. We also spent time working with teachers during professional development sessions on how to use technology in their lesson planning. Our goal is to purchase every student in grades 7-12 his/her own lap top. We also want to have lap top carts available for each grade at the elementary level. Our plan is to start with students in grades 9-12 first, hopefully, in the fall of 2013. But, before we get to that point, we wanted to be sure all of our teachers feel comfortable with technology and know how to incorporate it in their content areas.

We sent a team of teachers to the One-to-One Institute in Des Moines on April 11th. This is the second time we have sent teachers to this institute. This event was a great way to connect and learn from other schools that have already implemented one-to-one lap top programs. Over 550 educators attended this conference and all had the chance to collaborate with one another about how technology can transform education.

According to the conference's brochure, the goals for this One-to-One Institute were:

- ❖ Help Iowa's 1:1 school districts learn from each other about innovative teaching, learning, and administrative practices that are occurring in their districts
- ❖ Build excitement around the 1:1 lap top computing initiatives in the state
- ❖ Help others who are interested in 1:1 computing learn more about how to get started and be successful

We will be spending some of our professional development time for teachers during the 2012-2013 school year working with them on different strategies for incorporating technology into their lesson planning. It is very important that all of our teachers feel very prepared to integrate technology into their classroom before we roll out the lap tops to our students. I have been extremely impressed with our teachers' enthusiasm and willingness to embrace these technology initiatives. They have taken their lesson planning to a new and exciting level!

Fun In Music

5th grade students have been working really hard on learning about the symphony. On April 17th they will be going to Cedar Falls to listen to Mussorgsky's "Pictures and Exhibition". Learning in Fifth Grade

Fish Iowa classes have recently begun, where students accumulate knowledge about water quality, fish identification, and how to make lures among other topics. These classes lead up to a Fish Iowa day in which the students get to apply what they have learned in an authentic environment.

Sixth Grade Events

The 6th graders graduated from DARE with a fabulous celebration at Heartland Acres. Buchanan County was well represented with students and teachers from Independence, Wapsie Valley, Jesup, St. John's, and East Buchanan. Mark Farley, UNI football coach, challenged the students to use the strategies and information learned in DARE in their lives. Tom Reiff, West essay winner, presented his piece. The graduation was followed with snacks, dancing, and prizes. Sheriff Wolfgram pulled together another fantastic day.



Several great activities will finish out our 2011 – 2012 school year. They include: Community Clean Up Day, a two week rotation of classes in which students will move from classroom to classroom for instruction throughout the day, and Track & Field Day on the last day of school.

Spring in the Junior High is an exciting time. Our students are looking ahead to transitioning to the next grade level. For our Eighth Graders, it is very exciting, as they are getting ready to become High School students. The 6th graders are getting ready to transition over to the Junior/Senior High. Both of these transitions can be a challenging and stressful event in a student's experience. As a Junior High, we will be conducting a 6th Grade orientation this spring and again the week before school starts to try to ease that transition. We want to be sure that all students feel safe and confident in these transitions.

One of the big topics we are going to address during this transition and next year in the Junior High, is bullying. The Junior High Staff will be working with students on what our roles are with stopping it. In the Independence Junior High we use our Respect and Protect program to deal with situations as they arise. We have spent time in our advisor groups teaching strategies to avoid bullies and what to do if you see or experience bullying at school. Many times in Junior High students do not realize the impact their hurtful words or actions can have on those around them. We have been working through our advisor time to teach this aspect.

Parents also play an important role in preventing bullying as well as helping those who have experienced it on any level. It is very important for parents to help kids understand bullying. Parents can talk about what bullying is and how to stand up to it safely with their children. It is very important to tell kids bullying is unacceptable. Just as important is making sure kids know how to get help. It is important for parents to keep the lines of communication open with their students. Parents need to check in with kids often, listen to them. Parents need to know their friends and ask about school. It is also very important to show them an understanding of their concerns. Most importantly, parents must model how to treat others with kindness and respect.

As a parent, if your student or a student you know has fallen victim there are some key things you can do. Encourage kids to speak to a trusted adult if they are bullied or see others being bullied. The adult can give comfort, support, and advice, even if they can't solve the problem directly. Encourage the child to report bullying if it happens. Talk about how to stand up to kids who bully. Give tips, like using humor and saying "stop" directly and confidently. Talk about what to do if those actions don't work, like walking away. Talk about strategies for staying safe, such as staying near adults or groups of other kids. Urge by showing kindness or getting help.

Together we can turn the tide against this behavior in Junior High. With staff, parents, and students being vigilant we can create a culture where bullying will not be tolerated.


