 - a. rated as commendable with 67.4 points

 - a. rated as commendable with 66.6 points
 - b. growth was made in all areas except attendance

 - i. School library programming should:
 - Support the media center mission and goals
 - Reflect interests of school community
 - Promote services available (staff/students)
 - Highlight and relate to collection
 - Develop and promote literacy
 - Entice/Encourage use of the library
 - ii. Examples of School Library Programming
 - Held during the school day or out of school hours
 - Geared toward specific audiences
 - Active programming/passive programming
 - Contests, activities, displays, celebrations, guest speakers, book clubs, etc.
 - iii. Input was given on future activities the committee would like to see the library sponsor/do
- IV. Shared Bullying and Harassment Prevention Goals 2018-2019
 - A. Ms. Meyer went over the goal summary for East Elementary 2017-2018
 - i. Reduce staff to staff perceived bullying to 0
 - This goal was not met
 - ii. Maintain 0 founded cases of bullying
 - This goal was met
 - B. Ms. Meyer went over the goals for 2018-2019
 - i. Decrease staff to staff perceived bullying to 0
 - ii. Maintain 0 founded cases of bullying
 - C. Mrs. Reed went over the goal summary for West Elementary 2017-2018
 - i. Increase the number of staff members who indicate they feel safe at school from 94.74% to 100%
 - This goal was met
 - ii. Increase the percent of students who report never being bullied from 51.87% to 60%
 - This goal was partially met: This year, the question was asked to include never/one in awhile.
 - Students reported a total of 84.6% have never/or once in awhile have been bullied
 - iii. Increase the percent of students who feel safe at school from 91.18% to

- D. Mrs. Reed went over the goals for 2018-2019
 - i. Increase the percent of West Elementary staff who report never being bullied from 74% to 100%
 - ii. Increase the percent of students who report never/once in awhile being bullied from 84.6% to 90%
- E. Mr. Howard and Mr. Hupke went over the goal summary for the Jr./Sr. High 2017-2018
 - i. Continue to have 100% of junior high staff members indicate they feel safe at school
 - This goal was not met
 - ii. Increase the percent of junior high students who indicate they feel safe at school from 86.9% to 90%
 - This goal was not met
 - iii. Continue to have 100% of senior high staff members indicate they feel safe at school
 - This goal was not met
 - iv. Increase the percentage of senior high students who indicate they feel safe at school from 86.5% to 92%
 - This goal was not met
- F. Mr. Howard and Mr. Hupke went over the goals for 2018-2019
 - i. Have 100% of junior high staff members indicate they feel safe at school
 - ii. To increase the amount of students at the junior high who indicate they feel safe at school to 85%
 - iii. To have 100% of senior high staff member indicated they feel safe at school.
 - iv. To increase the percentage of students at the senior high who indicate they feel safe at school to 92%
