## Budget [Continued from page 1]

The projection is based on the difference between the number of kindergarten students we have verses the number of students we have that are graduating. When a class of 140 will graduate and we have a class of 105 kindergarten students, the district sees a loss of 35 students. We know that we have students move in and out over the year and this number tends to balance itself out therefore the kindergarten verses graduation number is the one used.

In my last article I stressed that we need to encourage more families to come to our district for a list of various reasons. I forgot to mention that we have one of the strongest mentoring programs around. At last count we had over 130 matched pairs thus far this year. It is a wonderful program that meets the various needs of students across the district. If you know a family that wants excellence for their children in: achievement, social skills, involvement, and an attitude of caring, let them know about the Independence Community School District - we can meet those needs.

## CLIMB Theater Presents to West

CLIMB Theater actors and actresses presented a play for students at West Elementary on Thursday, March $8^{\text {th }}$. The theme was "Ride of Your Life." Students were taken on a journey by an alien to discover the truths about what bullying and harassment look like. The play addressed the issue for identifying the difference between tattling on another student and reporting incidents.
Students, although entertained, also witnessed what bullying looks like and that we have to stand up to bullies. Even innocent bystanders have a responsibility to stand up for others and report bullying to an adult. Students learned a new strategy to help them stand up to bullying called CALM. This acronym stands for Cool down, Assert yourself, Look the bully in the eye, and Mean it. Posters were provided to the school to reemphasize the strategy and give students the confidence that they can stand up to bullies.
This was an outstanding presentation and we hope to get them back next year.


## West Elementary Music:

Music class at West continues with our regular mix of instruments, singing note reading, and games. With the Winter Concert behind u*we tan now focus on buildir qserious musical reading and playing skills

Third graders recently used the xylophones to compose individual compositions based on the poem "Pease Porridge Hot" Students ch metated the melody on the inusical staff, and then perfo med for the class! In addition, third graders are practicing offheat rhythms while playing fun circie games, such as "Little Jornany Brown"

Fourth graders hav- iegi ing both hands on the recorder, playing such tunes as reptain Go Sidetrack Your Train" and "I Got a Letter This Morning Theyareal usily learting about and applying sixteenth note rivthnes in various combinations.

Fifth graders are studying $6 / 8$ tir., a difficult concept to read in music, but easy to perform (think skipping rhythms). Melodically, these students are exploring the C Major Scale, which uses all notes on the xylophone. In addition, we are listening to recorded music of various classical composers to prepare us for the trip to the Waterloo-Cedar Falls Symphony on April 17. More information will be sent home about this field trip in the near future.

## Art News

Fifth grade art students have been working on their Masterpiece paintings. They chose one art style to represent their idea. (Abstract, realism, still life, portrait, landscape, seascape, reproduction, logo, expressive or fantasy) Their paintings will be hung in the main hallway at West.
"Live Art" is a student presentation of famous works of art. Students will perform (in costume) in the main hallway at lunch time. This is always a favorite lesson for the students.

Fourth grade art students are working with clay. The concepts of proportion and form are taught to help students create a standing sculpture. Their project can be either a person or a cartoon character.

Third grade students are continuing to work on their Art History lessons. They have learned "How to look at art." ....WHO made it? WHAT do you see? WHERE is the artist from?
WHEN was it made? WHAT do you see? HOW was it made?
Artists that we have studied have been, Leonardo Da Vinci, Vincent Van Gogh, Winslow Homer, Pioneer crafts, and Grant Wood.

## Fish Iowa in $5^{\text {th }}$ Grade!



One of the highlights of fifth grade is the culminating unit called Fish Iowa. Fish Iowa is designed to teach students the skills needed to fish and it incorporates many subject areas, such as biology (fish anatomy/physiology and ecology) and geography (statewide rivers, lakes, and types of fish species). Fish Iowa helps students develop motor skills, teaches a lifetime recreational pursuit, and promotes mental health. Students will be attending a culminating day in May at the Buchanan County Wildlife Association Club. Fish ID, Water Quality, and Stream Table are some of the activities that are planned that day. Programs are taught or demonstrated by many Iowa DNR personnel. Fifth graders will have the opportunity to put to use the skills they learned in class on that day during a hands-on-fishing session.

Scott Kinseth, Iowa DNR officer who organizes this event each year visits the classrooms several times before the May date to teach the classes about fish management, fishing ethics and regulations, fishing equipment and lures, and casting. In one session, Scott teaches fifth graders how to make their own spinning lure. This is one learning experience that students and staff look forward to each year.

What is Buchanan County Success Center (BCSC)? We are an alternative educational program available to students in the school districts of Independence, Jesup, and East Buchanan. Our students come to us simply not able to meet their needs.

## What services are offered?

Independent Work: These students work on their courses away from the
center on their own time. There are currently five students working independently.
Evening Classes: This is a new service designed for students who work full-time during the school day. They attend $2-3$ evenings a week. Other students use these hours to make up time owed, catch up on schoolwork, or to get further along in their classes.
Dual-enrolled: Students enrolled in this service attend BCSC for one or two periods (out of four) and attend Independence High School or the High School diploma. There are 14 students dual-enrolled. High School diploma.

In the fall our students were all given an opportunity to submit work to an Iowa publication of art and literature magazine (for students attending an alternative school/program) called, "The Mandala". Four
students had their work chosen for publication. Eleventh graders Kyrsten Armstrong and Samantha Hare and seniors Felicia Chacey and
Timothy White each had work published in the magazine.

What would you see if you visited?
You would see students sitting at tables or computers working on assignments, writing, reading, doing math, working on special projects, or talking to staff members. You may also observe a group session with a counselor, one-on-one
counseling, game day, field trips, goal setting, or prize drawings for various accomplishments.
The success of the program depends on the ability of the staff to help each student grow as a "whole" person. At BCSC we take into account emotional, behavioral, physical, social, and intellectual growth.
As you can see, BCSC is a non-traditional setting used by a wide variety of students attempting to receive a high school diploma. Our goal is to see as many students achieve their goals in a safe environment and to see them move on to be productive members of society
