Our staff and students were able to transition nicely into their school routines and the business of learning once again. I have great admiration for all of our staff members. It is hard to believe that we are heading to the end of the first term for the secondary students and the first trimester for the elementary students. The end of the first term for our 7-12 grade students is October 22nd. The end of the first trimester for our K-6 students is November 12th

Certified Enrollment

We certified our enrollment with the State Department of Education on October 15th. Certified enrollment determines how much the school district receives per student from the state of Iowa in the next fiscal year. So, our count this fall helps determine our budget for the 2014-2015 school year.

Our actual enrollment this year is 1391. Last year it was 1381. This is an increase of 10 students. We had 1274 resident students last year. This year we have 1269. So, we have decreased slightly in resident students. Our increase comes from our open enrolled in students and our tuition in students. Our open enrolled in students totaled 53 last year. This year we have 63 open enrolled in students. Last year we had 101 students open enrolled out to other districts. This year we have 108 open enrolled out students.

We are pleased that we have more students attending our school district this year for whatever reason. We will continue to market our school district and let people know we have one of the best 3A schools in the State of Iowa!

Needs Assessment

We will be facilitating a Comprehensive School Improvement Needs Assessment Survey this fall to seek input from our community about our school district. You could consider this Needs Assessment as a high achievement Wellness Check-Up for our school district.

Curriculum

After looking closely at district data, our District Leadership Team determined this year's district initiative would be Reading Achievement. What does this mean? Our principals and teachers have taken a look at what they are doing in their classrooms and with their supplemental instruction (a closer look at academic needs for all students, struggling or exceling). This supplemental instruction, also known as intervention, has proven to be beneficial for many of our students; therefore it will continue this school year. Teachers will also be looking at their core instruction and making changes or enhancements.

When deciding the district initiative, I mentioned we looked at district data, Curriculum/Student Services multiple pieces of district data. I shared a major piece of this data in our Annual Progress Report to the community. Below is another piece of data the District Leadership Team analyzed. This particular piece of data shows Iowa Assessment growth over time. It's a great way to follow a particular class or look at grade level achievement over time. Pay close attention to the percent proficient (80% indicates meeting core instruction) and NSS scores in comparison to the National NSS Average.

Nurse News

As colder weather approaches, remember to dress your child in weather appropriate clothing. Hats, gloves or mittens, winter coats, snow pants and snow boots are a necessity for a child to be able to feel comfortable while outside for recess in the winter months. All students will go outside for recess unless the temperature is below zero.

During the cooler months we see an increase in the number of students who are ill. If your child is ill, please keep them home. We are again providing the Iowa Department of Public Health (IDPH) with the number of students absent and what symptoms the students

are experiencing. When you notify the school that your child is ill, please provide some basic symptoms that they are experiencing. No personal or identifying information is given to the IDPH.

Reasons to keep your child home from school include:

- **Fever greater than 100 degrees.** Students need to be fever free **without** the use of tylenol, motrin, advil, or other fever reducing medicines before returning to school.
- **Diarrhea or vomiting.** They may return to school 24 hours after the last episode if they have been able to keep a full meal down.
- Rash of unknown origin.
- Severe sore throat. A minor sore throat without fever can be managed at school. You may send your child with throat lozenges and a written permission slip. The health office does not carry throat lozenges. Students with known strep may return to school after 24 hours of antibiotic therapy.

Not all illnesses will fit nicely into these categories. If your child appears ill to you, keep them home for their comfort and to avoid the spread of disease. As always, consult your health care provider with any questions or concerns you may have about your child's health.

Good hand washing and getting a flu vaccine are some of the best ways to avoid getting sick. It isn't too late for you or your child to receive an influenza vaccine.


Off and Running with Respect as the Focus

4th Grade

It has been a busy time in fourth grade. Students have been working hard to build reading stamina. To help with this at home, make sure your child has a quiet place to read for at least 20 minutes each night. In math we are working on multiplication. Students need to practice nightly to increase their rate and accuracy. Some ways you can practice at home include having your child roll two dice to work on the factors to six, use dominoes and have them multiply the two ends or draw two cards from a deck and multiply. Students also have their own login information for the Everyday Math Online site. It has math games they can get use to practice facts. We look forward to seeing all our families at conferences in November.

5th Grade

The fifth graders are really starting to get into the swing of things. In Mrs. Holtzman's class, students are finishing up their study of Iowa History by creating an Iowa ABC book of topics they have learned about. They have also started their exploration of magnetism and electricity.

In Ms. Larson's class, students have been working hard learning about the editing process and perfecting their writing samples. Students have also been learning about estimation as well as adding, subtracting, and multiplying decimals.

Mr. Abildtrup's class is wrapping up their study of Iowa by completing an ABC Book based on tourist attractions, Iowa heroes, and things that symbolize Iowa. Students have also finished up their unit on adding, subtracting, and multiplying decimals and have begun to explore angle measures.

Students in Mrs. Kinseth's class have been working on writing by studying the 6 traits of writing, in

particular ideas and word choice. Students are writing cinquain poems using a Halloween theme. They have been reading non-fiction books and learning about text features like: title, subtitle, graphic organizers, bold-face words, italics, glossary, index and diagrams. Students who read and met their weekly at home reading goals for September were rewarded with a camping theme read-in. We pitched our tents and enjoyed stories with a sweet snack (s'mores).

Fifth graders participated in the traditional trip to Living History Farms in Urbandale, Iowa on September 26th. They enjoyed

the beautiful weather while traveling through 300 years of Iowa living. They traveled along the trails to visit the Ioway Indian Village, the 1850 Pioneer Farm, 1900 Farm and through the village of Walnut Hill. Students visited the Print Shop, Blacksmith, Tangen Home, One-Room Schoolhouse, General Store, and the Flynn Mansion, to mention a few. This trip will be discussed all year long in our social studies units.

This fall has been a time of great excitement in the Independence Junior/ Senior High. We have moved into our new building and this has created some amazing changes in the atmosphere and delivery of instruction. Our teachers have access to technology that has not been available in the past. The students have their designated areas and the facilities are second to none. We are very excited as we continue through the year to see the impact of the new environment on our students.

The new environment has already had an effect on our passing times. One of the major changes was the implementation of the locker pod area. Students all have their lockers grouped in the pod area. This allows for increased

supervision of all lockers. This has also kept the students moving. They congregate quickly but then return back to the junior high hallway. The frequency of tardiness has decreased significantly from the old building. This allows for a smoother transition from class to class and increased instruction time.

With the increase in instruction time teachers have been utilizing the many technology enhancements that have been incorporated into the new building to keep junior high students engaged in the classroom. These improvements include a fully functioning overhead projector that can connect to the teachers' computer to display information, videos, and other engaging materials visually. Each classroom is also equipped with a full set of high quality speakers in the ceiling that are controlled by staff. This allows instruction to reach every corner of the room so that no matter where students are sitting they can hear the delivery of the technology. Finally with the speakers and projectors, each room also has a document camera that provides a live feed to the projectors. This allows staff to broadcast manipulative documents and other three dimensional objects to the board. This is especially useful when sharing objects and artifacts with the class.

With the enhancement of the learning environment this fall, the junior high staff has also been working to implement all of the changes we have asked of them this fall. We have drastically altered the junior high schedule to allow for a "intervention" time for all junior high students. This time is allocated to help our students who have specific deficiencies in reading or math. For those students who may not have deficiencies this time allows them to enhance their core knowledge through projects, reading time, or other activities that enrich their school experience. We have been very pleased with the implementation of this intervention time and look forward to seeing it show improvements on our assessments.

It has been a very neat fall here in the Independence Junior/Senior High. The students and staff have been very appreciative of all the changes and look forward to raising the quality experience for all students.

Pretty soon things start to come easier. The baseball looks like a beach ball. All you have to do is keep the momentum going, going, going, going - - - - until you knock it out of the park.
