During the past 12 months, the district has worked tirelessly in developing a "Return to Learn" plan and supporting students who decided to either learn on campus or at home. We've provided nutritional meals, mental health services, and other services to support our students and staff. Needless to say, it's been a very challenging school year and we're not out of the woods yet.

Our goal is for a "return to normal" to start the 2021-22 school year. No decision has been made but we believe we can start the school year under normal circumstances but

only time will tell. As we finish up this school year, we have decided to hold programs, award ceremonies, and graduation for our students and families. Please note, we'll still require masks to be worn inside school buildings but we are loosening up other mitigation efforts. We ask that if you attend these functions, you adhere to our district policies for the safety of our students and others.

The building project continues to move along and on schedule. I am adding pictures to the district website on a weekly basis so feel free to log on and check out the progress of the 6th grade addition and the renovations at West Elementary. I believe we'll be able to start the school year in the new classrooms and on time.

Currently, our last day of school is scheduled for Thursday, May 27th. This day could be in question as we are asking for a waiver due to the district hosting a funeral for Sgt. Jim Smith on Friday, April 16th. I expect to know in the coming week and we will communicate it out to our students, parents, and community as soon as we hear anything.

As we finish up the final few weeks of school, I'd like to thank everyone for being flexible and tolerant during a very difficult year. Our staff and the administration are working hard to finish the school year and preparing for summer opportunities.

Congratulations to the class of 2021... Graduation is scheduled for Sunday, May 23rd in the Junior/Senior High School. Go Mustangs!!

Portrait of a Graduate

In the fall of 2019, Independence Community School District

began working with Central Rivers AEA to create our Portrait of a Graduate. Portrait of a Graduate is a process that engages stakeholders to create a picture of what a graduate should look like upon leaving our school. In short, what are the hopes, aspirations, and dreams that our community has for our young people and what are the skills and mindsets that our children need for success in this rapidly changing and complex world? So far, we have been able to gather input from over 300 stakeholders including parents, community members, teachers, administrators, and students. The stakeholder group that we are seeking more input from is our community members and business owners. The School Improvement Advisory Committee (SIAC) will be working with staff to reach out to businesses in the community over the next couple of months. It is our hope that we will be able to gather input and feedback from this stakeholder group in order to help us design our Portrait of a Graduate. I want to thank those individuals that have taken the time to provide input and help us with our vision.

Iowa Statewide Assessment of Student Progress (ISASP) Update

Testing has begun at West Elementary and will begin at the JSH next week. Staff and students are doing a great job with this. The Iowa Statewide Assessment of Student Progress (ISASP) is aligned with the Iowa Core standards, providing a clear and accurate assessment of student learning outcomes. These assessments were developed in collaboration with Iowa educators and are available online for students at West Elementary and at the Jr./Sr. High School. ISASP is administered each Spring, although last year we received a waiver excusing us from the tests. Students in grades 3-11 take tests in math, reading and writing. Students in grades 5, 8, and 10 also take a science test.

Test questions are not all multiple choice, like they were with previous Iowa Assessments. The English, math, and science tests evaluate students' skills using a mix of item types including technology-enhanced questions as well as open-ended essay questions. The results will provide a detailed analysis of how students performed relevant to the proficiency definitions set on the Iowa Core standards. We are hopeful that we will have some of the results back from these tests before the end of the school year which will allow us to plan appropriately for future instruction.

Three Big Summer Announcements

The first big announcement: Independence Community School District will change our Internet domain name from independence.k12.ia.us to indeek12.org. All of the staff email addresses will change to the new domain. The district website and Internet services will all change to the new domain over the course of the summer. We expect everything to be converted by fall 2022. There will be more information coming over the summer as we transition to our new domain: indeek12.org.

The second big announcement: We are moving our registration start date to Monday, July 5, 2021. Registration will end on Monday, July 19, 2021. We want to move registration to July so we are better prepared to start school in August. We need more time to prepare bus routes, health status and student services before school starts.

We will be using the same process as last year and the same applications. You will log into your PowerSchool Parent Portal to start the registration process, use InfoSnap to update and edit your information and finally you will be able to pay fees using MySchoolBucks.

You will receive your InfoSnap letter at 6:00 am on July 5th and will be able to register your student for 2021-2022. We expect registration process to go well since we are using the same forms and questions from last year.

To prepare for registration, please try to log into your PowerSchool Parent Portal before school is dismissed in May. If you need username or password reset, please contact your student's building office.

Please take time over the summer to check into Free and Reduced status for your family. With COVID, many families did not fill out the Free and Reduced form for 2020-2021. The district will be emphasizing these forms this year and encourage families to look into guidelines and take advantage of the Free and Reduced status. Free and Reduced families will have reduced registration fees and reduced meal fees once the COVID meal support has ended. It is very important for the school district to have accurate free and reduced information for use in state and federal reports. Other school funding is based on our free and reduced status.

The third big announcement for 2021: Students will receive new Acer Chromebooks in the fall. Dates for 7-12 distribution will be communicated later in May. Grades 7-12 will take the Chromebooks home each night and grades 3-6 will leave the Chromebooks in the classroom.


We Are

Third Grade

Third graders have been analyzing characters in order to develop a deeper understanding of stories. They have also been learning how to infer and determine the message or moral of a story. In writing, students are practicing informative writing strategies that include brainstorming topic ideas, writing true facts, and using non-fiction text features to enhance their writing. They are still working on using complete sentences in their writing. In math, third graders are working hard to master their multiplication basic facts. They have learned how to solve multiplication facts by skip counting, drawing arrays, and using equal groups. They will end their year exploring fractions and multiplying large numbers. In social studies, students have done a fantastic job of engaging in conversations centered around immigration and migration, why people move from one place to another, and how that affects their lives. We will finish our year by exploring weather patterns in science. MUSTANG

Fourth Grade

This spring, students have been busy diving into experiments with our Energizing Everything and Waves of Sound units. They've been enjoying the hands-on lessons of figuring out how sound works and how energy is transferred. In social studies, students are continuing to dive into different aspects of American history. We will soon explore poetry and review some of our priority standards during our literacy blocks. In



Fifth Grade

Spring is in the air! Our 5th graders have been very busy learning about fractions, fractions. Improper fractions, mixed numbers, common denominators, simplest form, decimal and percent equivalents. They are studying how to apply the operations with these concepts as well. In literacy class, students are learning about informational text to understand text structure and efficiently use text features. They are also learning about the author's purpose and studying new vocabulary to improve comprehension. Our young writers have been working on several different pieces which include biographies, how to writing, poetry, and opinion pieces. In Social Studies, our 5th graders have been finishing up the study of the thirteen colonies, and they are beginning the inquiry of the Revolutionary War. Science is always a favorite as 5th graders have been investigating how mold grows, the importance of aquifers, and experimenting with chemical magic.

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Sixth Grade

With all the quiet sitting time during the ISASP testing week, we wanted the kids to have an opportunity for some fun academics to get them out of their seats. One of the science standards is to engineer a project. We gathered materials and directed them to work with 1-2 other students in creating two working catapults. Upon completion, the catapults were put to the test to see which could project the farthest and which was the strongest. The kids enjoyed the opportunity for creativity and collaboration. Some may not have even realized how much thinking work they were still doing.

During this last quarter of sixth grade, our students will be reading diversity themed books in book club groups. There are lessons from our reading curriculum (Social Issues: Reading for Empathy and Advocacy) that complement these novels. We will continue with a deeper study of characters by analyzing character relationships and group-related issues.

In math, the students have been learning about negative numbers, particularly graphing with negative numbers, coordinate line graphs, and inequalities on a number line. This unit will be followed up with a unit reviewing decimal concepts and decimal computation. We will conclude the year analyzing data: identifying outliers, analyzing the spread and center of data, as well as interpreting and creating box and whisker plots and line plots.

During May, we will walk over to the JSH building for an academic tour and mini orientation. Students are split into small groups led by current JH students to the main areas they will be using next year. There is typically a question and answer session with staff members and/or current seventh graders. This helps ease major concerns and gets them excited for all the exciting new changes in seventh grade.

We are looking forward to an outdoor field trip in May at Fontana. Each classroom will spend a fun day outdoors, learning how to use a compass and how to canoe. We look forward to a day away from school learning with Buchanan County conservationists Sondra and Michael.

Art

Over the next few weeks in Art, we will continue working on our drawing skills, craftsmanship, and creativity. We will focus on Texture and Space while continuing to review the Elements of Art. Kindergarteners, First Graders, and Second Graders recently finished their collages using painted paper. Eric Carle, Lois Ehlert, and Leo Lionni are some of the illustrators we have studied that use similar art making methods in their children's book illustrations. The West Elementary art classes are busy working on weaving projects as we focus on Texture, Shape, and Form. Sixth grade classes are painting their clay pinch pots. Third graders have begun researching an animal as they create a unique animal habitat. In fourth grade, we are designing a room with a pop out design. Fifth graders are beginning to work on one-point perspective. It has been a wonderful year in art class!

PE- West

Before the school doors close for the summer, students at West Elementary have a lot to look forward to in Physical Education class! Students are currently finishing up playing Shipwreck this PE cycle and then will transition into bowling. As the weather continues to warm up, students will be outside participating in a scavenger hunt, whiffle ball, bean bag-tag, and frisbee golf. We have the second mile run to finish up our presidential fitness testing before school is out and plan to complete that last fitness test sometime in late April or early May. Please continue to encourage your son/daughter to be active and to live a healthy and happy lifestyle.

3-6 Music

As the school year comes to a close, 3-6 Music students are working hard on hands-on units. 3rd and 4th grade are composing their own music and performing their compositions for their classmates using rhythm sticks and Boomwhackers. 5th and 6th grade students are doing a short ukulele unit in the Band room. All students will end their year with a fun Music Escape Room as well as some Music games. A reminder that if students would like to participate in the West Elementary Virtual Talent Show, their videos are due no later than May 1. 5/6 Choir will have a concert on May 10 at 7:00 PM in the JSH Gymnasium.

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Hello from the administrative team at Independence Jr/Sr High School!

With the recent tragic death of Iowa State Patrol Sergeant Jim Smith, Mr. Hupke and I decided to collaborate on this 2021 Spring Newsletter. Honestly, we would have probably written the same (or at least very similar) things.

So, here goes...

Upon receiving the devastating news, the outpouring of support was almost instantaneous. Immediate family, church members, friends, political dignitaries, police personnel (from all over the country),

students, district staff and hundreds of individuals in Independence wanted to console/help the Smith family. Nothing seemed too great for people to do to help/console the Smith family.

Knowing this fact, and to possibly accommodate the enormous amount of people slated to attend the funeral, Mr. Reiter and the Independence Community School District Board of Education granted the Smith family the use of the Jr/Sr High School. As an administrative team, we wholeheartedly supported this decision and knew it would be an honor to hold this solemn occasion. However, we also knew the amount of work it would take to prepare the building for nearly three thousand people in such a short time. Here is a summary of what happened and also some facts we learned in the process.

Starting on Monday, and continuing throughout the week, staff, students and administration met and planned how the building needed to be cleaned, organized, and set up for Sgt. Smith's funeral. The emergency response team, a small staff group, gathered nearly every day to review plans and to make needed adjustments. These meetings were in response to the daily briefings by the Iowa State Patrol and Concerns of Police Survivors (C.O.P.S.).

On Tuesday, physical education students (and others) plus multiple staff members began the organizational and cleaning process. Some were assigned to arrange, extremely precisely, nearly 700 chairs on the floor of the gymnasium. Others used rags, scrub brushes and putty knives (to address gum) to thoroughly clean the weight room, wrestling room, locker rooms and media center. Some cleaned and disinfected classrooms and office space. Still others covered some windows with black paper to help ensure privacy for the dignitaries and law enforcement officers who would be attending the funeral. Finally, a pretty large contingent of pupils chose to collect garbage around the campus. No student or staff member had to take these actions. They wanted to do so in honor of Sgt. Smith and to support his family! In reality, what we believed may take most of the week we had done in less than one day. We were extremely proud!

On Wednesday and Thursday, the preparations continued. A crew of adults and students (again all volunteers) built the set and did video and sound checks. The custodial staff and emergency response team cleaned other parts of the building including the entryway, commons, auditorium and restrooms. Office personnel gathered hand sanitizer, kleenex, masks and other necessary supplies. Finally, the cleaning done the previous day was revisited, just in case something was unintentionally omitted. After nearly three complete days, and hundreds of hours of commitment, dedication and effort, we had achieved our shared mission of showing the deepest respect and sympathy to the Smith family for the tragic loss of their husband, father, son, brother, uncle and friend. We were ready for Friday. So, what did we learn from this process? Well, the list is seemingly endless, but please allow us to focus on a few:

- Due to the work of numerous individuals, parts of the building looked better than many had observed in a long time.
- Our staff and students have a tremendous sense of pride.
- Our staff and students are some of the best in the state, and this showed by their willingness to serve others in their time of need. Just think about this... When have you ever known teenagers to voluntarily choose to clean something? Last week, they did for Jim Smith.
- We are very proud to be working for and with the students, staff and parents/guardians of the Independence Jr/Sr High School.
- A community who comes together for a collective mission can accomplish anything.

While compiling this data I always find it interesting to see how many students we have involved in something. In addition to what the state asks us to report, we offer various other activities or clubs that are not included in this survey. At Independence CSD we have a large majority of our students involved in something and over 50% involved in multiple things. However, we still have some that are not involved. With such a wide variety of sports, activities, or clubs I recommend that every student take advantage of doing something that interests them. Activities can enhance the educational experience. Studies have shown that students who are involved feel more connected with their school. When students feel connected they have a better overall high school experience. Someday I would like to fill out a report like this or look at our own data and see 100% of students involved.

Information from your School Nursing Department



Kindergarten Health Requirements

For all students entering Kindergarten it is required by the state to have the following complete:

- Vision screening- Can be conducted by ophthalmologist, optometrist, primary care doctor's office, or sometimes there are community based programs.
- Dental examine
- Immunizations

The above must be complete and the nurse have documentation **prior** to the start of the 2021-2022 school year.

3rd grade Health Requirements

For all students entering 3rd grade, it is required by state law, that they have a vision screening. The vision screenings can be conducted by an ophthalmologist, optometrist, primary care doctor's office, or sometimes there are community based programs.

The vision screening must be completed 6 month- 1 year prior to the beginning of the 2021-2022 school year. Proof of exam must be given to the school nurse upon completion.

7th grade Health Requirements

Per the administrative rule, <u>ALL</u> students entering 7th grade are required to have one meningococcal vaccine. If your student/students have had a previous meningitis, in order to be valid, it must have been given after age 10. If your student/students had one prior to age 10, they are required to have another one given. This must be complete <u>PRIOR</u> to the beginning of the 2021-2022 school year.

Another important immunization requirement for <u>ALL</u> students entering 7th grade is that they are required to have a Tdap booster. This must be complete <u>PRIOR</u> to the beginning of the 2021-2022 school year.

12th grade Health Requirements

Per the administrative rule, <u>ALL</u> students entering 12th grade are required to have two doses of meningococcal vaccine. The only exception is if first dose of meningococcal vaccine was given at 16 years of age or older, only one dose is required. Again, this must be complete <u>PRIOR</u> to the beginning of the 2021-2022 school year. If you have any questions, please contact your primary care provider or Jennifer Eddy, Jr/Sr High Nurse.

Also, as a reminder please make sure to update your student's health conditions and concerns on PowerSchool under the health section.
