Two of those projects planned for this summer are adding air conditioning to West Elementary and resurfacing our track. It will be very nice to have all buildings now air conditioned. Not only will the air quality be more conducive for learning during the warmer weather months but we also won't have to let school out because of the hot temperatures. Every six to seven years, we usually need to resurface our all-weather track too. The infrastructure of the track itself is still good but the top surface wears down over time. So, that project will be happening this summer as well.

We are also moving forward with our elementary playground project. We will be installing the new concrete and the rubber tiles for the playground area at East this summer too.

One last item to mention, of course, is our new baseball/softball complex facility. We have been fortunate to have had fairly nice spring weather this year and we are making good progress with that project. As of this writing, we are planning to have both fields ready to use for the upcoming baseball/softball seasons. If something should happen to delay the work on this project, we do have a "Plan B" in place to move forward.

Long Range Strategic Plan

During the 2016-2017 school year, one of my goals is to update our long range strategic plan for our school district. I will be working with staff, administration, students, parents, community members, as well as our school board members, to establish goals and action steps for the following areas:

- Student Achievement
- Culture/Climate and Communication
- Integrating technology in all content areas
- Finance and Facilities

It is best practice for school districts to create a strategic plan for the goal areas they feel will best meet their needs. It is also best practice to review and update these goals every five years. It is now time for us to work on our new strategic plan. More information on this will be coming out next fall. We will also look at the information from the most recent Needs Assessment Survey that we had staff, parents, and community members fill out as well. We are required to do a Needs Assessment every five years and we did our last one the year before the Department of Education's Site Visit to our school district. The results of that Needs Assessment Survey are posted on our website under the District Information Tab.

May is School Board Recognition Month

The statewide School Board Recognition occurs in the month of May. Our ICSD School Board Members are responsible for formulating school system policy, approving curriculum, maintaining facilities, and adhering to state/federal law. Our board members spend many hours in board training programs and personal study to enhance their understanding of these issues.

I would like to extend my deepest appreciation to our current board members, Brian Eddy, Shelly Whited, Eric Smith, Heather Meador, and Kim Hansen, for their dedication and commitment to our school district. Each of them devotes many hours of volunteer time to help our school district become the best it can be.

Teacher Leadership Compensation Grant by Danielle Meyer, Director of School Improvement

We have done a lot of work to prepare for the TLC grant. The committee, which consists of the building principals, superintendent, and teachers from each building, met. The grant will be used to hire a variety of positions to our district. All positions will be filled by the end of the 2015-2016 school year.

Instructional Coaches

The Instructional Coach is a fulltime teacher with at least three years experience and within ICSD, a minimum of one year. Coaches will also collaborate with administrators in aligning district vision, goals, and initiatives.

The coach will primarily work one on one with teachers to improve instruction and student learning. Responsibilities of the Instructional Coach:

- assist teachers in curriculum implementation, instructional strategies, and technology integration
- routinely do walk throughs and extended classroom observations to provide coaching for best instructional practices
- assist teachers in reviewing student achievement data
- assist teachers in Iowa Core Curriculum alignment
- serve as a resource to help guide teachers in the use of technology in their instruction
- provide support to teachers in the classroom in regards to summative and formative assessments
- help guide Multi-Tiered System of Supports (MTSS) process
- provide professional development support and implementation monitoring of Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports (PBIS)
- coordinate the school-wide expectations of *Living the Mustang Way* and working with teachers to incorporate PBIS philosophies in their classrooms
- be responsible for modeling best instructional practices in the beginning teachers classrooms

Curriculum Leaders

Curriculum Leaders are full time teachers with additional curriculum duties fulfilled outside the contracted day. Leaders will work collaboratively with administration, Instructional Coaches, and Mentor Teachers. Responsibilities of the Curriculum Leader:

- plan professional development learning activities designed to improve instruction
- engage in development, adoption, and implementation of curriculum materials
- guide their grade level/subject areas in data analysis through the PLC process
- provide grade level/subject area support for technology integration
- provide resources to enhance classroom instruction
- support grade level/subject area assessment of student learning
- be an active member of the building's PBIS team
- provide input for Living the Mustang Way into grade level/subject areas

Mentor Teachers

Mentor teachers are full time teachers that will work with beginning teachers on best practices in the classroom. They will provide guidance and support for beginning teachers. Mentor teachers will be models of teaching excellence. Responsibilities of the Mentor Teacher:

- serve as exemplary models of teaching and providing support to all teachers with a focus on beginning teachers
- be available to assist teachers in reviewing student achievement data and best practices to help guide instruction
- assist beginning teachers with alignment of the Iowa Core Curriculum
- serve as model teachers in regards to technology integration
- share how they use a multi-tiered approach to supporting students learning
- be an active members of the PBIS team

As the district approaches summer 2016, we need to have 100% PowerSchool Parent Portal accounts created for fall registration. We will not be using InfoSnap so there will be no summer letter with a Snap code. It is imperative that all parents create a PowerSchool Parent Portal account.

Registration for 2016-2017 will open on August 1, 2016 and will close on August 15, 2016.

East has 271 accounts needing to be created.

West has 315 accounts needing to be created.

JSH has 314 accounts needing need to be created.

The countdown will begin at these numbers with the ultimate goal of zero. While we are running the countdown, we will also have a friendly competition between the buildings. The first building to have all parent accounts created will be awarded Gold-Star status and will be published as the winner in the fall newsletter.

On Friday of each week, Steve will update the status of each building. We will also publish the numbers on Facebook and Twitter so you can follow along.

By the time you are reading this newsletter, you will receive the first secure email with your account information and instructions. I will continue to send out bi-weekly email reminders to parents who need to create accounts. Each time I send parent emails, the number should be dwindling. We want all parent accounts created by May 31, 2016.

You do not need to create separate accounts for each student. Also, accounts are carried over from year-to-year. Once the account is created and your students are added, the account stays active through graduation.

If parents have already created an account, it is easy to add additional students to your current account. Sign into Parent Portal, scroll down and find System Preferences on the left. Once you click this icon, you are able to click students and add siblings.




East Elementary Book Fair - Huge Success!

In math we have been working on multiplication and division. We are learning various strategies, such as Partial Products and Lattice, to solve two-digit and three-digit multiplication problems. Students continue to work on basic facts.

We recently finished our Nutrition and Digestion unit in science. Miss Angie, from Fontana, came in to share information about nutrients. Students explored the diets of various animals, focusing on proteins, vitamins, fats, and carbohydrates.

In writing, students recently completed a unit on opinion pieces and are now focusing on informative writing. Students are very excited to research their topic of interest and share the new information that they learn.

The third graders have been reading between 300 and 400 minutes each month. In February, we were able to go to Pizza Hut to celebrate with our Book It certificates for a personal pan pizza. What an exciting field trip! We will be heading to Pizza Hut again this month to celebrate our March reading achievements. We were also able to go to Lucky 10 bowling alley as a reward for meeting our reading goals. As the end of the school year is approaching, the remaining science units in fourth grade are the circulatory system and the weather unit. News From 5th Grade

Fifth graders at West have been working extremely hard this year. Students, in Math, have been learning about fractions, (adding & subtracting fractions, mixed numbers; with like and unlike denominators). We also continue practicing multiplication of two digit numbers and long division. Fifth grade students are improving in reading, increasing their vocabulary level, using strategies for comprehension while citing text evidence. They have been working on writing focusing on the various story elements such as the characterization, plot, and problem/solution in their stories. In Social Studies, we have been learning about the 13 American colonies. We are busy making colony tangrams to demonstrate what we have learned. The culminating activity will be learning a colonial craft or job. Some classes will be presenting their facts in a display or colonial fair. Science for several classes have been studying the properties of magnetism and the principles of electricity. Students will demonstrate their learning in hands-on activities and projects. Other classes have completed the study of the human eye. 5th graders learned the parts of the eye and their function. The unit ended in an eye dissection lab; where students dissected pigs' eyes (donated by Mark's Locker in Rowley). They worked with a partner to identify the important parts of the eye that we had previously learned in class.





News From 6th Grade

On Thursday, April 7th, West Elementary 6th graders joined the rest of Buchanan County's 6th graders at Heartland Acres for D.A.R.E. graduation. The students completed the Drug Awareness Resistance Education program with Sheriff Bill Wolfgram. This year was a special celebration honoring the sheriff for 25 years of teaching. The guest speaker, who was part of Sheriff Wolfgram's second year class, was University of Iowa and National Football League player, Robert Gallery. Gallery challenged all students to treat others respectfully and to make wise life choices. D.A.R.E. essay winners from each school shared their essays during the graduation as well. Grace Reidy was chosen to represent Independence. Sheriff Wolfgram was presented with a quilt designed by Peggy Short and sewn by Jan Reed, an Independence 6th grade teacher. "Summer Maintenance"

The summer is quickly approaching; students have worked hard to learn new skills and strategies to solving problems, reading books and being socially active. Summer break can be a time students may not maintain some of their hard work from the school year. Here are some short and simple strategies for educational summer maintenance.

Students should read for 15 minutes everyday. If you have students who are not at the reading age, then have someone read to them. If you have students who are reading, then read with them. Making time to read is reinforcing and you are modeling the positive behavior.

Find unique ways to incorporate math for beginning learners. Create visuals to count, add, and subtract. When outside, grab a handful of rocks to create adding or subtracting problems. Allowing students to help you bake is an excellent way to introduce them to measuring and problem solving.

The last strategy is from an educational researcher Benjamin Bloom who created domains of learning and is centered on questioning. Here are examples that can be utilized in any setting to engage your student to create, evaluate, analyze, apply, understand, and remember.

Remember: How would you describe...? Understand: What might happen next...? Apply: Which approach would you...?

Analyze: Why do you think...?

Evaluate: Which is more important...?

Create: Could you invent...?

These strategies are to assist in engaging your students learning during summer break, if you miss a day here and there that's ok! Enjoy the summer and GO MUSTANGS!

Curriculum Cycles

The goal of the Independence Community Schools is to have a guaranteed and viable curriculum. This means that it does not matter which teacher your child gets that they will master the exact same skills in each grade level. This guaranteed and viable curriculum should be set around Essential Learnings. These are the skills that we feel each child must know in each grade. The problem is the Core does not offer teachers the Essential Learnings.

Much of the work of our Professional Learning Communities (PLC's) is based around teachers coming to an agreement amongst a grade level team or content area team on determining the Essential Learnings. Once that is determined they will figure out the success criteria for students to master these learnings. In short, what does mastery of these skills look like, or how are they assessed?

Right now, East Elementary and West Elementary are working through a needs assessment for reading. This work is to help us make an informed decision on what we need to support our students in reading. So far, we have reached a few conclusions. First, we do not have the in-depth knowledge of the Iowa Core that we desire. Second, there is a need for reading support, we just are not sure if that is a series, instructional support, or materials. Professional development will be based around these needs.

- Independence was the only school at the 2016 Iowa Jazz Championships with 2 jazz bands.
- Three Independence students represented our school and community in the Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade.
- A time capsule was buried in front of the school to be opened in 50 years.
- David Greene, a World War II veteran and participant in the Battle of Iwo Jima, spoke at our Veterans' Day Program.
- Our art students received the most first place awards at the WaMac Art Show!
- Alaina K. became the first Independence student to sign to bowl at the collegiate level.
- The sophomore class earned the group incentive for Iowa Assessments as their complete composite was 88%.
- Brian S. earned the highest total score in the school on Iowa Assessments.
- The Independence School Board has made the National Career Readiness Exam a graduation requirement for the Class of 2017.
- Twenty Jr/Sr High students where recognized at the Eastern Iowa Reading Council Creative Writing and Poetry Contest.
- 86% of all HS students met at least one of the goal scores on Iowa Assessments.
- Archery was started as a club for Independence students.
- The new baseball and softball fields are progressing nicely and should be ready for the summer.



Activities By Justin Putz, Activities Director

Every spring the Iowa High School Athletic Association has its member schools do a student participation survey. While this process can be a little time consuming I find the numbers interesting enough that I thought I would share in this spring newsletter. very close to the opening of registration and time will be very limited to create parent accounts.

When you log into PowerSchool Parent Portal, you will notice a button called eRegistration. This button is active and you are able to update your demographic information but not pay fees. Once the entire district goes through the registration process, eRegistration will continue to be available for parents to update demographic information, view registration fees and pay additional fees as needed.

As of April 2016, the Lunch program is a separate entity and will require you to continue to use this program to apply money to student meal accounts. Eventually, our new eRegistration and the Lunch program will be combined so you will be able to apply meal fees from eRegistration.

In August, you will create a RevTrak account. RevTrak requires a separate account for payment but uses your PowerSchool account information to authenticate you and your children. RevTrak is a separate program and will bear the responsibility of processing credit/debit cards, checks and echecks for district and building fees. You will be able to see district and building fees through your Parent Portal.

Let's begin the countdown and get Parent Portal accounts created.
