Comprehensive School Improvement Site Visit Report

The Department of Education conducted their Comprehensive School Improvement Site Visit this past November 18th and 19th. We have now received their final report. This site visit was designed to assess the district's progress with its Comprehensive School Improvement Plan, provide a general assessment of educational practices within the school, make recommendations for improvement, and determine compliance with state accreditation

standards and applicable federal program requirements.

Based on their findings, the Independence Community School District maintains the State of Iowa Accreditation. We were in 100% compliance with all of the state's accreditation standards. No non-compliance issues were noted and no corrective action plan was required to turn back into the Department of Education.

We are very pleased with this report. The Department of Education Site Visit Team noted many positive improvements to our school district since their last visit during the 2009-2010 school year.

The report is divided into seven categories:

- Vision, Mission, and Goals
- Leadership
- Collaborative Relationships
- Learning Environment
- Curriculum and Instruction
- Professional Development
- Monitoring and Accountability

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After looking at all of our school's information and interviewing staff, students, parents, community members, and board members, the Department of Education Site Visit Team indicated areas of strength and areas of recommendation under each of the seven categories in their final report. The areas of recommendation will serve as a road map for our school and will help us make the improvements needed as we move forward.

Attendance Center Rankings

Iowa Legislators in 2013 directed the Iowa Department of Education through House File 215 to develop a system for evaluating the performance of all public schools in Iowa on certain measures and ranking the schools according to their results. The system is known as the Attendance Center Rankings.

As of January 30, 2015, this website will be available to look up information about any public school or district including ours. You may find the new website, http://reports.educateiowa.gov/acr, a good source of information.

This website was developed by the Iowa Department of Education as a first step in meeting the requirement of the 2013 education reform law. This law requires the Department to evaluate and rank schools based on their performance on nine specific measures and to post this information on its website.

This evaluation system is under development and we expect to see a more complete system next fall. According to the Iowa Department of Education, the system will be rolled out in phases this year and next year. It is important to note that the new website available now **does not** represent the complete evaluation system. Instead, it represents the performance of each public school and district on **two of the nine** measures required by law which are:

- * Student Proficiency Rate: The percentage of students proficient in math and reading in grades 3-8 and 11 based on the state assessment results. Iowa's definition of "proficient" means performing at a basic level. Proficiency does not necessarily put students on the path to college and career readiness.
- ❖ Growth Toward College and Career Readiness: The percentage of students who met a growth target needed to be college and career ready. The Department has worked with our state assessment developer to link the Iowa Assessments (used to be called ITBS/ITED) to the college and career readiness benchmarks defined by the ACT. The growth measure sets an expectation that all students will make progress each year and will be ready for college by the end of 12th grade.

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The other seven performance measures are: attendance rates, parent involvement, employee turnover, community activities and involvement, graduation rate, college readiness, and closing achievement gaps.

This information can complement the conversations in our school district and community about our work to provide students a great education. However, student performance data only tell part of the story about how our schools are doing. To get the full story, I encourage you to stay connected with our schools as much as possible. Thanks for all of your support for our students and our school district.

Professional Development

Since we are well into the school year and are starting to look at a school calendar for next year, the administration has taken the time to discuss the benefits of having all day professional development (PD) once a month. From the staff and parents sampled, the overwhelming response is they prefer the once a month PD schedule that was used this year. This allows teachers the time to collaborate and plan the strategies presented. It also allows parents to plan for one day a month rather than multiple times throughout the month.

This year each building has focused on a variety of PD topics. Both East and West have taken the time to really dig into the Iowa Core. Our

AEA 267 has been a tremendous resource for our elementary schools and has spent two entire days presenting new material to the teachers. Both schools commented that they walked away with strategies they could implement in their classes.

At the Jr/Sr High they have spent time on numerous topics. One of the changes teachers have seen this year is the implementation of Canvas. This program allows teachers and students to access materials online. The educational opportunities for this program are endless. Therefore the teachers have taken advantage of the all day PD's to learn more about the program and how it can benefit students. They have also focused on culture and climate of the building.

District-wide teachers will be spending time on establishing our Subject Area Committees. These teams of teachers will meet to better align their curriculum with the Iowa Core. Teachers will be discussing standards, objectives, instructional strategies, and assessments. This work will be valuable as we look to vertically align our curriculum K-12. The goal is for ICSD to have a guaranteed viable curriculum.

School Improvement Advisory Committee (SIAC)

The SIAC has met twice already this year, we had a great turn out of all stakeholders: educators, administrators, community members, parents, and students. The committee was reminded that Iowa Code Section 280.12(2) states the BOE appoints and charges SIAC with making recommendations to the Board on an annual basis. The following topics will be addressed this year:

- Major educational needs
- Student learning goals
- Curriculum, assessment and instruction
- Long range and annual goals
- Bullying and harassment prevention goals
- Any other issues which relate to school improvement

The focus of the February 23rd meeting will be addressing two of the goals improving communication with students, parents, and community and building partnerships with local businesses and community. We will be creating an action plan to see improvements in both goal areas.




Book Fair Success!

Nurse News

"Breakfast is the most important meal of the day." How many times in our lives have we heard that expression? Research has shown that breakfast is the most important meal of the day. A nutritious breakfast provides approximately one fourth of the recommended dietary allowances of many of our needed vitamins and minerals. Children who skip breakfast do not make up for lost nutrients later in the day. Yet, on any given day in the US, 50% of children go to school hungry. Not making time for breakfast, children left on their own to prepare meals, lack of appetite, and no access to nutritional foods is listed as some of the reasons that children skip this important meal.

Children who skip breakfast have trouble concentrating at school and can become inattentive and restless by late morning. Breakfast eaters are more likely to be calmer, less anxious, and more focused in school. Children that are hungry can have both physical and psychosocial symptoms. Physical symptoms of hunger include stomach pain, headache, muscle fatigue, and sleepiness. Psychosocial complaints can include anxiety, nervousness, anger, fidgetiness, hostility, confusion, and unhappiness.

A good breakfast is one that includes one type of cereal or grain, fruit, and a dairy product. A balanced breakfast provides a child with enough energy until lunch. It can be a quick and easy meal at home, at school, or on the go. Consider putting a breakfast together the night before that can be eaten cold or easily reheated. Try to avoid high sugar content cereals and breakfast bars that can rapidly increase and then decrease blood sugar levels.

We wouldn't start off on a long car trip with an empty tank of gas, yet many of our children start their school day with empty stomachs. Take time to "fill 'er up!" before their school day starts.

Music

The 4-6 music students are starting to learn how to play classroom instruments. 4th grade students are beginning recorder karate, in which they will have a student-run classroom. 4th graders will learn the notes of the recorder, and create diagrams to help them remember how to play those notes, and then will be allowed to work in partners/small groups to achieve their recorder belts, playing more difficult music to earn higher belts.

5th grade students are learning the basics of playing piano. Like the 4th grade students, 5th graders will work in partners, and the class will be divided in half. While half of the class is practicing their piano skills, the other half will be practicing rhythm, note identification, and solfege (do, re, mi).

6th grade students have already started learning guitar. We have explored three chords so far, with four chords as our goal so that we can start learning strum patterns, and changing between chords.

Once we hit February, class time will be divided between instrument practice and preparation for the upcoming Spring Program which includes all students in grades 4-6 on March 26. Musical selections are made based on the instruments we have been working with in the classroom. The theme for this performance is "Music Matters" and will be a wonderful showcase of all of the hard work these young musicians have put in this year.

3rd Grade

Third graders recently completed an Our City Junior Achievement program. A local member of the community visited each classroom for five sessions on cities, city planning and zoning, entrepreneurship, saving money, and banking. Students are currently studying continents and oceans, writing skills, and multiplication and division. Grace Rathert, who works with the Food Corps, visits third grade classrooms to give students hands-on experiences with many things we are studying. Her lessons have focused on soil and the water cycle. We look forward to her visits, as they will soon be aligned with our digestion and nutrition unit.





4th Grade

In fourth grade, new reading genres continue to be introduced in guided reading. We are continuing to work on multiplication and division facts. The processes can be a struggle, but the students are eager to learn the steps involved. The respiratory and circulatory systems will be the focus in science. The upcoming focus in social studies will be the land, resources, and history of the Midwest region. We hope that the students are sharing what they are learning at home!

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5th Grade

In Ms. Ferres' class, we have been working on Native American tribes. We are comparing five different tribes and discussing civilizations. We also are coming up with characteristics to describe each tribe and civilizations. The kids are also having a great time reading biographies and learning about different famous people from our past. We also have been working on the elements of a plot. The kids have been using children stories and nursery rhymes to discuss each part of a plot. In math, the kids are learning about fractions, decimals, and percents.


Mrs. Holtzman's class has just begun a geometry unit in math, where we are working on measuring angles using a protractor and classifying quadrilaterals. In Language Arts, we are finishing up our study of informational text. Recently, the students have been studying non-fiction text structures and writing paragraphs using the different structures. After finishing a mini unit on Vikings, the students are now learning about the Age of Exploration! During this unit, students will study famous explorers from Marco Polo to Robert La Salle.

Mrs. Kinseth's 5th graders began a unit on fractions in math class this month. They are using fraction kits and fraction circles to help them understand how to add and subtract fractions with unlike denominators. In Literacy, we are reading Sign of the Beaver by Elizabeth George Speare. We are reading about how one boy, Matt, learns to survive in the wilderness with the help of Saknis and Attean, members of the Penobscots in the Maine Territory in 1769. We are also learning about Martin Luther King, Jr. We created a foldable to highlight the life of this great human rights activist. In Social Studies we are learning about the Age of Exploration in the Americas. We will culminate this unit with a Grand Encounter as we understand the impact of European Explorers on the Native Americans they encountered.

West Elementary 5th graders enjoyed a visit from Buchanan County Naturalist, Sondra Cabell. She presented an environmental footprint activity with our students. She took them through a web-based survey to allow students to understand the impact life choices have on our environment. They looked at how they use energy and how they could make choices that could help protect our environment for the future.

6th Grade

Hear Ye! Hear Ye! Our 6th graders are very excited about the upcoming play called "Forgiven: A Fairy Tale." This fractured fairy tale explores how kindness and forgiveness can be shown to anyone, even those who have done terrible things. The play is being directed by Gina Homan. The performances will be on Saturday, April 11th at 7p.m. and Sunday, April 12th at 2:30 p.m. in our beautiful Junior Senior High School Auditorium.



As part of our genre study of will be learning about the time period

historical fiction, the sixth graders known as the Middle Ages. Each

student will read a novel set in that time period, and we will be learning about the elements of that particular time in history during social studies. This will include topics such as the feudal system, castles, knights, and medicine. We will compare and contrast historical fiction to other fiction in addition to biographies and nonfiction passages. Sometimes it is very difficult to differentiate among these books, but with practice, the students will learn to identity the key features of each!

Independence Agriculture Education Featured in National Publication

The resources, community support and funding structure of the Independence Agriculture Education Program has caught national attention after being featured in The Agriculture Education Magazine, a national publication sponsored by the National Association of Agricultural Educators.

Highlighted throughout the article is an account of the multiple resources available to Independence Junior Senior High School students creating the opportunity for multiple experiential and hands-on learning experiences. Just a couple examples include students' work in studying pest pressures and growth stages of the soybeans planted in the 50-acre crop plot, taking soil samples following harvest to analyze soil and nutrient conditions. Coming this spring, students will be able to work in the program's greenhouse and plant the nearly two-acre garden. Courses also include many science application labs and industry speakers.

Course registration will begin in the coming weeks and the support of community members, school board and district administration will ensure such great resources continue to benefit and impact the learning experiences for our students.
