This committee has met twice so far and is making good progress on the design of the 2016-2017 school calendar. We also sent out a survey asking for people's input on next year's calendar. We ended up having 383 people fill out the survey. Of the 383 people responding, 217 were parents, 7 were community members, 55 were staff members from the Jr/Sr High School, 45 were staff members from West Elementary, 36 were staff members from East Elementary, and there were 18 in the Other Category. The committee really appreciated getting this kind of input and feedback from so many people!

Our hope is to get feedback from each of the buildings and then hold the Public Hearing in regard to next year's calendar sometime before the March Board Meeting. The Board would then need to officially approve the calendar at their March 21<sup>st</sup> meeting.

#### 2015-2016 School Board Goals

The school board held a work session in Brandon this past fall. The focus of that work session was for the board to review and update their goals for the school district.

The goals they established were as follows:

- 1. Obtaining and sustaining academic excellence
- 2. Responsibly manage fiscal resources
- 3. Establish a strong public relations/marketing program
- 4. Establish a long term facility plan
- 5. Create an exemplary activities department

The board also reviewed and updated the steps/strategies, resources needed, and the outcomes for each of the goal areas. These goals and action steps can be found on our school's website. Please go to our Home Page and click on the District Information tab. The Board of Education is listed under that tab. Click on Board of Education and it will take you to their 2015-2016 goals page.

### **Early Literacy Legislation**

Many of you have probably either read about or heard about Iowa's Early Literacy Legislation. Reading assessments are part of a comprehensive statewide literacy initiative that focuses on making sure Iowa students are successful readers by the end of third grade. Early intervention is critical for struggling readers. Reading assessments serve as a screening tool to identify students who are struggling and to get them the help they need to get back on track.

Schools screen students in kindergarten through third grade three times a year, in the fall, winter, and spring. Students perform either above or below the target score. Students who score below the target score on one screening assessment are provided with regular monitoring to ensure they stay on track. They also may be provided with additional reading instruction, called intervention. Based on two consecutive screenings, schools then determine for all of the screened students whether they are "adequately progressing", "at risk", or identified as having a "substantial deficiency". Interventions are provided for those students identified as being at risk having a substantial deficiency.

I am writing about this now because under Iowa law, schools will provide intensive summer reading programs starting in May, 2017, for students who have a substantial deficiency in reading at the end of third grade. Students who have a substantial deficiency in reading at the end of third grade <u>must complete the school's intensive reading program to advance to fourth grade</u>, unless they qualify for an exemption.

Our school currently does a good job of monitoring our students' reading and communicating their progress to parents. For the past two summers, we have already offered a summer reading program for all students in grades K-3 who are non-proficient or have a substantial deficiency in reading. We will continue to provide such a program as we move forward too. We feel this extra summer help is really important to help all of our students be successful readers.

As we learn more about this Early Literacy Legislation, we will be sure to get this communicated out to everyone.

# School Improvement by Danielle Meyer, Director of School Improvement

### **Teacher Leadership Compensation Grant**

The goals of the Teacher Leadership and Compensation are:

- Attract able and promising new teachers by offering competitive starting salaries and offering short-term and long-term professional development and leadership opportunities.
- Retain effective teachers by providing enhanced career opportunities.
- Promote collaboration by developing and supporting opportunities for teachers in schools and school districts statewide to learn from each other.

- Reward professional growth and effective teaching by providing pathways for career opportunities that come with increased leadership responsibilities and involve increased compensation.
- Improve student achievement by strengthening instruction.

We have done a lot of work to prepare for the TLC grant. The committee, which consists of the building principals, superintendent, and teachers from each building, meet this month. There will be four new Instructional Coaches. East, West, Jr/Sr High will all have a full time coach. The district will also hire one K-12 Special Education Coach. These coaches will serve as a support for all our teachers. The grant will also allow for the district to hire 11 curriculum leaders. Teachers will serve in this capacity in addition to their teaching responsibilities. The district will also hire five mentor teachers to help support our newly hired teachers.

## **Curriculum/ Professional Development**

The district has spent some time this year updating the curriculum cycles. The goal of the Independence Community Schools is to have a guaranteed and viable curriculum. This means that it does not matter which teacher your child gets that they will master the exact same skills in each grade level. This guaranteed and viable curriculum should be set around Essential Learnings. These are the skills that we feel each child must know in each grade.

During Professional Development days the teachers have spent time meeting in Professional Learning Communities (PLC's). A PLC is an ongoing process in which educators work collaboratively in recurring cycles of collective inquiry and action research to achieve better results for the students they serve. PLCs operate under the assumption that the key to improved learning for students is continuous job-embedded learning for educators. Much of the work of our PLC's is based around teachers coming to an agreement amongst a grade level team or content area team on determining the Essential Learnings. Once that is determined they will figure out the success criteria for students to master these learnings.

# **School Registration 2016-2017**

You might be thinking why are we reading about registration in February? Do I need to do something for registration right away? Yes - Every family needs to have a PowerSchool Parent Portal account. The district requires 100% of families to have Parent accounts for 2016-2017 Registration. We only have about 30% of district families with an account as of January 22, 2016.

The District used InfoSnap for several years. We have switched to GrantWood eRegistration. eRegistration is tightly integrated with PowerSchool and will allow for more timely information going into PowerSchool. As part of our switch to eRegistration, we also will switch to RevTrak for registration fees. The great news for parents (fees will not be cheaper), you will be able to see transactions in PowerSchool Parent Portal.

As of this writing the registration fees for 2016-2017 have not been set but are planned for February 15, 2016, as part of the regularly scheduled Board of Education meeting.

There are additional benefits of eRegistration and RevTrak, which include:

- All-year access to update demographic information
- All-year access to check on fees and all transactions
- Fee management built into PowerSchool
- RevTrak is expandable and the district office will be able to accept credit/debit cards
- All parent registration data will reside in PowerSchool, not split between InfoSnap and PowerSchool
- No need for SNAP codes and individual registration letters
- You may contact the district for all registration questions and never be referred to InfoSnap
- Transaction receipts are available in PowerSchool Parent Portal

In order to take advantage of our new eRegistration program, parents must create PowerSchool Parent Portal. You are able to do this at anytime and we strongly encourage you to create an account before March, 2016. If you already have a PowerSchool Parent Portal account you do not need to recreate the account. Some parents believe they have a parent account but are actually using the Student PowerSchool account. If you log into PowerSchool with your email address or parent username, you have a parent account. If your login name is your student's username, you need to create a Parent account.

Creating a Parent account only takes about 10 minutes, but you must contact your child's building to have instructions and user information emailed/sent to you. This letter is required to create a parent portal account.

Once you create or confirm your Parent PowerSchool portal account, you will be ready to create a RevTrak account. RevTrak requires a separate account for payment but uses your PowerSchool account information to authenticate you and your children. RevTrak is a separate program and will bear the responsibility of processing credit/debit cards, checks and echecks for district and building fees.



## **Third Grade**

Third graders are concluding work on writing narrative compositions and will begin composing opinion pieces. They participate in Daily 5 and work on reading strategies in small groups in addition to receiving

reading intervention three times per week. Throughout the second trimester, students have completed math units on multiplication and division, place value in whole numbers and decimals, and are currently studying geometry. They also receive two additional thirty-minute periods of differentiated math instruction each week. In Social Studies, students studied the various types of communities, developed geography skills and studied Earth's continents and oceans. We invited guest community members into our classrooms to teach Junior Achievement lessons targeted on life skills involving money management as well as city zoning and planning. Students are currently beginning a science unit on nutrition and digestion.

## 6th Grade

The current topic of study in sixth grade science is simple machines. Students are beginning by exploring the advantage of using levers. The experiments involve the students figuring out the best placement of the load, fulcrum, and effort. A spring scale and the use of Newtons allow them to form educated conclusions. Students will examine everyday tools that are levers such as scissors, hammers, and even their own arms to determine if they are Class 1, Class 2, or Class 3 levers. A unit on pulleys will follow, and then later students will explore wheels and axles, screws, and inclined planes in simple machine centers. By the end of this study, students will determine that all simple machines have both advantages and disadvantages.

As part of our genre study of historical fiction, sixth graders are learning about the time period known as the Middle Ages. We have read short literature selections that have included pieces about Robin Hood and King Arthur. In addition to that, each student has been reading a novel that takes place in this time period, and we are learning about the characteristics and events of that particular time in history during social studies. This will include topics such as the feudal system, castle life and structure, knights, and medicine. We will compare and contrast historical fiction to other fiction, in addition to biographies and works of nonfiction. Be prepared to hear about the crazy meals and other bizarre aspects of daily life in the Middle Ages.

Thanks to the support of parents, students and community members, the West Elementary Book Fair held in November was once again a great success. Our book fair sales for two days was slightly over \$4,000. This gave us a profit of about \$2,000 in Scholastic Dollars to spend through Scholastic. Sixty-five books were taken from the book fair before it was sent back. Twenty of those books were given to students as prizes. The remaining profit will be used to order additional library books and materials.

understand our world and find a deeper meaning. Working with students and my own children, when faced with a discipline issue or situation I always look at the "why", "why would my child behave that way?" or "why would they make THAT decision?" To understand motivation of behaviors, we work to understand what the response is to the behavior.

Reinforcement is how we get behaviors, providing a positive or negative consequence will reinforce the desired behavior, "Tell me and I forget; show me and I remember; involve me and I understand."

depending on what is more impactful to the student will reinforce the behavior to happen or not happen over time. If an unwanted behavior is exhibited, it's important to follow up the consequence with why the behavior is unwanted and then teach the desired behavior, then give the positive reinforcement when the desired behavior happens. Everything comes back to the "why" or the motivation for us to behave the way we do. When working with your student, attempt to reinforce the positive, consequence the negative and celebrate the victories!

Here are some of Independence Activities Successes from this year to date:

- Ryan Adams qualified for the State Cross Country meet. He is only the fourth male qualifier in the last 25 years.
- The volleyball team played in their third consecutive regional final.

- 3 fall athletes were selected for all-state teams.

- The wrestling team won the Wamac East title and had 3 individual Wamac tournament champions.
- The wrestling team currently has four wrestlers rated in the top ten in the state.

- The Independence band and vocal programs had 6 all-state performers this year.
- The junior high band had NEIBA honor band with two selected to participate in All-Iowa 8<sup>th</sup> Grade honor band.
- Two vocalists were selected to be in the semi-finalist at the Dorian Vocal Music Festival.
- The large group speech program qualified 38 students participating in 8 events for the state competition.

As I look at this list it is hard not to be impressed with the accomplishments of the students involved in the Independence Activities program in a little over half a school year. So many times people get caught up in results that they can miss the great accomplishments that are happening daily. These accomplishments are a tribute the work that our students are putting in on a daily basis. With this type of work ethic I am excited to see what this list will look like at the end of the year.


### **Independence Community Schools** Volunteer & Mentor Program Update by Val Maximovich 2015-16 School Year

### Continued from page 5... School Registration 2016-2017

PowerSchool and RevTrak are required accounts for you to be able to register for 2016-2017. You may and are encouraged to create the Parent PowerSchool account as soon as possible. We will be sending out instructions in April for the RevTrak account, but everyone needs the Parent account created before the RevTrak account will function.



Since I am writing about accounts, all K-12 parents will want to create a Canvas account for 2016-2017. I wrote in November about Canvas and we are expanding its use to K-12 for 2016-2017. All parents will be able to see important information within Canvas. Each building will be using Canvas in various ways, but the district will emphasize Canvas for next year.

Another account is SchoolMessenger. If you have a Parent Portal account, you are able to manage SchoolMessenger information from the Parent Portal. Remember, SchoolMessenger allows you to add more phone numbers, email addresses and text message information.

The final account is the Lunch account. The Lunch account allows you to add money for student meals. Please contact Annette Harbaugh in the Food Service department to create an account.

To sum up this letter, (in case you just skipped to the end):

- Parents need to create a Parent Portal Account, one account per family. To create this account, contact your child's building to request a letter.
- Parents need the Parent Portal Account to create a RevTrak account in April once RevTrak is fully functional and tested.
- Parents may use the Parent Portal account to manage SchoolMessenger.
- Parents may create a separate Canvas account and will be strongly encouraged as we approach September, 2016.
- Parents may create a separate Lunch account to pay for food service fees.

All of these various accounts can be confusing, but they all start with a valid PowerSchool Parent Account. Please create your account soon.
